CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Summary on Curriculum Planning and Implementation : Shri Samarth Arts and Commerce College, Ashti is permanently affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University. The college adopts prescribed syllabus provided by the university from time to time. Our college offers traditional courses namely Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce . It did not introduce any new courses such as value added courses, short term courses in 2018-19. Nature of Programmes Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University has introduced semester pattern syllabus at under-graduate courses from 2016-17. The semester pattern syllabus for B. A. and Choice Based Credit System for B. Com. as per the prescribed by the university was adopted by the college from 2016-17. The programme is of three years duration equally divided into six semesters. Though college has limited flexibility of curriculum and programmes, B. A. offers choices to opt subjects as Economics, History, Marathi Literature, Political Science and Sociology. In programme of B. Com., there is limited choices to opt subjects for students. Each subject has only one paper having four units. As per the semester system, the evaluation system categorized into two heads as (a) Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE), and (b) Continuous External Evaluation (CEE). The internal evaluation is based on 20 internal marks

allotted by teachers while external evaluation is based on theory examination of 80 marks conducted by the university. Subject-wise Teaching Plan All teachers prepared subject-wise teaching plans at the beginning of the session 2018-19. It contains number of units, contents/topics, allocation of lectures by teachers, references, methods of teaching-learning, unit tests etc. All teachers put their efforts for completing prescribed syllabus in time. The teaching plans are put before the staff council meeting chaired by the Principal for approval. Curriculum Delivery and Implementation All teachers engage their classroom teaching as per the teaching plans. The classroom teaching is mostly confined to traditional method applied by teachers. IQAC insisted that teacher should apply student's centric method such as participative learning, experiential learning, and collaborative learning, facilitate effective learning etc. for the students. The participatory method includes students' seminar, group discussion, chart preparation, home assignments, vivo-voce and power point presentation conducted during the academic year 2018-19. Review and Documentation of Curriculum Delivery The process of curriculum implementation was reviewed in the staff council meeting under the chairmanship of the Principal of the college. The Principal reviewed the completion of syllabus in accordance with teaching plans in the meeting. In all five meetings were conducted and review of curriculum delivery was made throughout the year. All teachers maintained their daily teaching diary and updated students' profile for effective curriculum delivery. The records of unit tests and participative learning method are documented by teachers and submitted to the Principal. There is limited use to apply ICT and e-learning resources by teachers. There is need to apply intensive and effective use of ICT based activities by teachers. So that the learning outcomes would be fulfilled at expected level.

Feedback Obtained

Analysis of Students Feedback : Internal Quality Assurance Cell conducted Students' Feedback on teachers during March 19 to April 8, 2019 in the college. 40 students participated in this exercise, in which 17 students and 23 students were from Arts and Commerce faculties respectively. Observations: 1. Around 80 students cited that the knowledge of teachers is very good. 2. Around 75 students responded that teachers having a very good communication skill while 20 students recorded that teachers having a sufficient communication skill during daily classroom teaching. 3. More than 80 students opined that teachers are very sincere to impart knowledge among students. 4. About twothird students reported that teachers put very good efforts to integrate contents and course materials while onefifth reported put good efforts to integrate it. 5. Around 80 students reported that teachers are accessible and available to discuss with students in the college. 6. More than 80 students reported that teachers are very able to apply participatory methods during classroom teaching. Analysis of Alumni Feedback : Internal Quality Assurance Cell organized an Alumni meeting on December 15, 2018 in the college. The Principal and IQAC Coordinator were present to the meeting. Total 33 alumni were present in the meeting. They shared their experiences of college education through feedback. Observations: 1) Nearly 80 of respondents reported agreed about significance of learning methods of the college for progression. 2) Around 60 of respondents cited that the role of career and counseling cell of the college is significant for their future development. 3) About onethird of respondents agreed about the role of career and counseling cell for future development to some extent. 4) Nearly 65 of respondents agreed about library and support services as a source of learning, while nearly onefourth of respondents agreed to this up to some extent. 5) Nearly 65 of respondents agreed that value education is useful personal development, while onethird agreed to this up to some extent. 6) Nearly 55 of respondents reported that college services are compatible with the fulfillment of learning needs of students. 7) About 67 of respondents agreed that they are ready to put efforts for development of the college in form of donating educational materials and other . Analysis of Parent Feedback : Internal Quality Assurance Cell organized a parent meeting in the college on March 18, 2019. The Principal, Coordinator of IQAC and Incharge of the committee were present. Observations ? All parent expressed that they are

concerned about regular attendance of their wards in the college. ? They cited that their wards interact with us about activities performed by the college throughout the year. ? All parents are concerned about the submission of documents related to admission, examination, scholarship etc. in the college. ? The parent mentioned that atmosphere of the college is good and suitable for progression of their wards. Despite having low awareness and response of parent to attend the meeting, the college will put efforts to participate more numbers of parent in the meeting.

Student is an important stakeholder of higher education institutions. Students
 participation in various activities performed is key indicator of their
holistic development. Our institution aims at inculcating values and developing
leadership among students. The students representation and participation was
activated in form of (a) student council, (b) college magazine and (c) Women
grievance cell. The details of these activities in 2018-19 are as follows. A)
Students Council: Students council is a statuary body in the college which is
related with students duty and obligations. The student council consists of

student representatives of every class The selection of the student representatives is based on the academic performance of previous examination. The secretary of student council is elected by student representatives. Two meetings of student council were held for the session 2018-19. The following resolutions were made in the meeting. i) To promote students participation in the college activities. ii) To organise cultural events by student council. iii) To determine dress code, institutional value and discipline among

students. Conducted Activities by Student Council - Student council organised cultural events with the participation of students in the college. The college has entrusted the responsibilities to students to perform activities in the college. The cultural events were organised on Jan. 24-25, 2019 in the college. Activities such as Rangoli competition, flower exhibition, solo and group dance, mimicry, drama etc. were performed by students. All events were monitored and managed effectively by student council in the college. B) College Magazine Committee: The college magazine committee promotes participation of students. Only students are allowed to contribute articles for the magazine titled as Zep (Marathi). It provides a literary platform where students can express their views on current scenario. Teachers of Deptt. of Marathi motivate students to take initiative in article writing. The magazine committee consists of two parts as (i) Magazine Advisory Committee and (ii) Students Editorial Committee. Students actively participate and display their articles on notice board . The Magazine Advisory Committee select basis of their relevance to social and national issues and publishes them in the magazine. Indeed, the college magazine Zep is a platform which promotes literary engagement among students. C) Womens Grievance Redressal Committee: Internal Women Grievance Redressed Committee is established in the college under the guidelines of VISHAKHA Judgement 2016. The purpose of the committee is to prevent and protect women staff and students against sexual harassment at workplace. The committee consists of (1) The Chairman ,(2) four girl students representatives, (3) three teachers as members and (4) an advocate as legal expertise for consultation on legal matters. The details of activities under the committee in 2018-19 are as follows. 1) A regular meeting of the committee was held in 2018-19. 2) A workshop on Women Security and Dignity was organised by the committee on International Women Day (March 8, 2019) in the college. Adv. Jayashree Raut (Member and legal expert) delivered lecture to students on the judiciary measures for women against sexual harassment at workplace.

The process of decentralization and participative management system is essential for effective functioning and decision-making of the institutions. The teaching staff, IQAC and parent society are complementary to each other for executing the policies and activities in a time bound manner. Various activities are performed through the process of decentralization and

participative managementin the college. Following practices illustrate the combined effortswere made by teachers and parent societyduring 2018-19 in the college. Practice I:Completion of Sanskar and Unnati Projects The Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University introduced Sanskar and Unnati projects during 2018-19. The Principal of the college put a resolution of introducing the Projects in the college in IQAC meeting on October 15, 2018. Students are required to complete projects basedon case study of developmental schemes sponsored by the Government at village level. IQAC set up a five member committee consisting of Principal as Chairman, a Co-ordinator, and three teacher members to undertake the projects. Dr. Sanjay Deshpande was deputed as Co-ordinator of the projects while Dr. Anil Bhagat, Shri. Surendra Gothane and Yogesh Paylimode were given responsibility to guide students for completion of projects. Total 22 students were enrolled for projects. They were equally distributed among the teacher members to complete projects. All students successfully completed their projects and secured incentive marks as prescribed by the University. This illustrates how the college delegates responsibilities in decentralized and participative manner for the completion of projects. Practice 2:Role of Parent Society in organizing Workshopthrough Participative Management Directorate of Culture, Government of Maharashtra celebrated the year 2018-19 as Birth Centenary Year of great Marathi litterateurs namely, P. L. Deshpande, G. D. Madgulkar and great musician Sudhir Phadke. The Government sponsored workshops on writing, poetry and music in colleges throughout Maharashtra. As per the letter issued by the Government on December 4, 2018, our college was selected to organise the workshop. Our college accepted to host the workshop. However itwas not able to mitigate all expenses for workshop. Hence the college requested to Parent society to make financial provision to arrange the workshop. The members of parent society took initiative by granting of Rs. 15000/- to arrange the workshop.Consequently the daylong workshop was successfully organised on Jan. 23, 2019 in the college. Total 300 students of Block Ashti participated in the workshop. The role of members of the parent societywas not limited only to provide financial assistance to organisesuch a workshop but also they actively participated and monitored to make all type of arrangements for smooth conduct ofworkshop.Indeed, the successsets an example to execute plans into practices through the process of decentralized and participative management system.

2 – Best Practices			

Best Practice - I Students' Participation in Village Survey India is the country of villages. Rural India is quite rich in natural, agricultural and human resources. If human resources such as members of village bodies, Self Help Groups, rural youth and students are channelized properly it can bring about expected changes in rural life. The rural people are closer to nature and know how to utilize local resources properly. If rural youth actively participate to deal with local problems, it can accelerate village development. Therefore the participation of students in village survey in important in this context. A village survey is the means of communication between students and community. It facilitates to acquaint with local problems in rural area. The participation of students in village survey is the possible way to create awareness about rural area. The basic objectives of this practice are as follows : Objectives of the Practice ? To impart a sense of responsibility among students about rural atmosphere. ? To establish linkage between college and community ? To develop students' leadership in higher education institutions Context of the Practice Indian planners have made efforts to

execute various programmes in rural area in various Five Year Plans. However due to less participation of people, rural area is still far away from mainstream of development. In globalization period, there is an adverse effect on agriculture, rural employment and generation of economic activities in rural area. It has resulted to widen sectoral disparity in the country. In order to create awareness, the college has taken initiative to conduct village survey through students' participation . The college is situated semi-urban area. Most of the students come from rural and remote area. Ashti block is endowed with variety of resources. But it has remained backward due to less attention to utilize resources. In view to deal with local problems, the college put efforts to engage students in conducting survey. Role of Students' Participation India has a wide network of higher education institutions. Most of the colleges are located in rural India. Despite such a wide network , the students' capacity could not be transformed into productive assets in rural area. Even National Service Scheme was introduced in colleges. It aimed at participating students in community engagement. But it could not generate significant changes in rural life. It is seen that there is a wide spread apathy among educated students in rural area. For that, students' participation through colleges is the possible way to establish linkage with community. As an initiative towards this end, the college has conducted survey on 'Occupational Structure and Sources of Income' at village Pandhurna in block Ashti . Evidence of success The students conducted village survey at Pandhurna on February 19, 2019. Nine students of the college collected information through preparing schedule. Total 102 households were listed during field visit. Simple random sampling method was used for survey. The observations of the survey are as follows. Observations of the Survey 1) Around two-third of the total households is dependent on agricultural and allied activities for their subsistence. 2) 50 households are found under the category of small and marginal farmers while one-third are landless labourers. 3) It is observed that there is an inverse relationship between workforce in agriculture and the share of income. 4) The proportion of workforce in industry and service sector lies at 16 and 8, which contributes the share of income around 60 and 30 respectively. 5) The proportion of beneficiaries from schemes of social security is around 33. Following positive changes could been during survey. : 1) Participation : Nine students participated and collected data in village survey. 2) Creation of a sense of responsibility: The survey created a sense of responsibility among students. So that they can deal the problems of rural area in future. 3) Establishment of linkage with community: The survey helped to interconnect the linkage between college and community. This type of initiative can determine the role of college in village development in future course of action. Limitations: 1) Villagers hesitate to give information regarding economic and health issues. 2) There is a need to emerge the college as a medium of participation in rural area. The extension mechanism of the college should be more people centric. Resource Required 1) All teachers should active participate to deal with rural problems. 2) The village panchayats should cooperate while conducting survey. 3) Respondents and investigators should communicate effectively. So that errors can be minimized. Best Practice II Yoga for Students Yoga is an indivisible exercise for human beings for an active and healthy life. It depicts the relationship between nature and human beings. Yoga transforms in-built capacity into productive assets for human and society. Objectives of Practice The following objectives are given to define Yoga as best practice. ? To create awareness about Yoga in daily life among students ? To motivate them for healthy and discipline way of life Context of the Practice In historical view, India was specialized in Yoga practices in ancient period. Indian saints performed Yoga for their concentration. The importance of Yoga in daily life is explored by India from old age . The 21st century focuses on technology development of every section of the society. More attention is paid to utilize advanced technology in process of production. There is an inverse effect on the

efficiency and productivity of work as well as human fitness. Although India has large population, it lags behind in quality of life. Therefore, the importance of Yoga plays a decisive role for transforming workforce into productive assets. and strengthen mental and physical fitness. In order to propagate the importance of Yoga, United Nations resolved to celebrate 21st June as International Yoga Day from 2015 across the world. India was on the forefront to place a resolution in UNO for Yoga Day. Yoga in Higher Education The process of development depends upon the proportion of an active and efficient workforce in the country. According to Census 2011, the proportion of workforce (between the age group 15-59 yrs.) is 58 in total population. It is also known as demographic dividend or productive workforce. This demographic dividend mainly consists of students who engage in higher education institutions . Education is a transformative process which enhances capacity building and generation of confidence among students. It is possible to utilize their capacity in proper direction through Yoga practices. Yoga can transform students capacity into productive assets. In India, majority of the students are pursuing their education in rural area. There is low level of awareness about physical and mental fitness. Especially in girl students the health problems are more in rural area. Therefore, it is need of the time to pay more attention to rural students for their physical and mental balance. The college has introduced 'Yoga for Students' as an initiative to enhance their efficiency in daily life. 'Yoga for Students' as best practice Department of Physical Education took initiative to conduct Yoga sessions in the college. The following activities were performed under Yoga for students throughout year. International Yoga Day Department of Physical Education conducts International Yoga Day on 21 June 2018 . The Director of Physical Education explained the importance of Yoga in daily life and demonstrated it before to students and staff. Orientation for Yoga practice Students orientation programme was held in the college in October 2018 . It aimed at acquainting students about various initiatives and support facilities in the college . During this programme, Director of Physical Education appealed students to participate in Yoga sessions. . Yoga in Daily Sessions Yoga sesions were organized in class-wise batches in morning in the college. Suryanamaskar , Pranayam and Yogasans were performed in these sessions. Total 10 sessions were conducted during December 2018 to February 2019. 169 students participated in Yoga sessions. Suryanamaskar : Training Session The college organized training session of Suryanamaskar and Yoga for students in association with Hanuman Vyayam Prasarak Mandal, Amravati on January 3, 2019. Shri Sandeep Mandale from HVPM demonstrated various Yogasanas to students. Around 200 students participated in this session. Evidence of Success Yoga in college has found some positive changes for students' progression. They are as follows : 1) Participation of students: 169 students participated in daily Yoga session and training for Suryanamaskar . 2) Generation of Confidence: Yoga brings positive changes in terms of promotion of concentration and generation of confidence among students . Limitations 1) The low awareness about Yoga is the cause of low participation. It is needful to pay more attention to promote awareness among students in future. 2) The students hesitate to participate in Yoga. It is due to low awareness in students to explore their sense and consciousness about Yoga. Resource Required 1) Director of Physical Education is committed to conduct Yoga sessions. 2) Teachers should motivate students to participate in daily Yoga session. 3) Enthusiasm and participation of students in engaging Yoga is most important.

SHRI SAMARTH ARTS COMMERCE COLLEGE, ASHTI : Institutional Distinctiveness: Community Engagement through Village Adoption Education, Research and Extension is the three pillars of higher education system. Education is a process which transfers knowledge into the various strata of the society. It aims at uplifting society. These aspects are more interlinked to each others. An extension activity is the medium to connect college with communities. Extension activity plays an important role to strengthen linkage between college and community. The college puts its efforts to take such an initiative as 'Community Engagement through Village Adoption' in this direction. Vision of the College Ashti is a taluka place in Wardha district of Maharashtra. According to Census 2011, the block Ashti covers total 158 villages which are widely varied with socio-economic conditions. Most of the people are engaged in agricultural and ancillary activities for their subsistence. The college was established in 1989 with aimed to provision of higher education facilities in surrounding villages. The college has adopted in its vision and mission, 'to serve the community through extension activities' . Area of Study: Community Engagement through Village Adoption In order to creates awareness about community development. The college has conducted various extension activities throughout year in villages. The objectives of extension activities are as follow. 1) To create awareness about various welfare schemes in rural area 2) To determine the priority areas for study purpose 3) To establish linkage with community through extension activities The college has conducted various activities in villages such as Ashti, Botona, Drugwada, Kinhala, Lahan Arvi, Panchala, Pandhurna, Parsoda, Porgavan, Sahur, Sirkutni, Thar etc. in last three years. The study conducted focused on priority areas such as- attainment in elementary education, kitchen garden and food security, welfare schemes, health awareness, income sources in occupations and Self Help Groups. The Priority area under Community Engagement The block Ashti is widely varied with socio-economic conditions. Most of the villages are divided into a sub-village panchayats. Various studies conducted by the college show that villages are still away from the basic facilities offered by Government. The local administrative mechanism is failed to deliver various welfare measures at village level. It is resulted that there is an adverse impact on village development. In order to identify the priority area, NSS unit of the college conducted a baseline survey at village Panchala and Porgavan in 2018-19. The observations found show that these villages are still away from the mainstream of the development and faced several problems as compared to other villages. Therefore, Village Porgavan and Panchala has been selected as adopted village for community engagement. The college will take initiative in adopted village in association with various stakeholders such as village panchayat, block level administrative agencies, teachers and students in future. It also reflects in conducting various extension activities from time to time. The college would review the stated mission in future course of action. It is humble effort of the college to establish distinctiveness in this direction.
